**BACKGROUND:** On November 23, 2010, AUSD Board of Education received a charter renewal petition from the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE). The Board is required by law to grant or deny the petition within 60 days of the Public Hearing held on January 11, 2011 or within 90 days with the consent of the petitioners and the Superintendent.

Tonight the Board of Education will receive the staff recommendation to inform the Board of Education prior to approving or denying the BASE Charter Renewal on February 8, 2011.

# Petition to Renew Operation of the Alternatives in Action (AIA) Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE) Charter School (Subject to Execution of Revisions, Conditions and Memoranda of Understanding)

WHEREAS, the California Legislature has charged local school boards with reviewing and acting on petitions for establishment and operation of charter schools; and

WHEREAS, Alternatives in Action (AIA) as a California non-profit corporation has delivered a Charter School Petition ("Petition") to the Alameda Unified School District ("District") to renew operation of the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE) ("Charter School"); and

WHEREAS, a Petition for renewal of the charter of the Bay Area School of Enterprise was received by the District's Board of Education ("Board") on November 23, 2010, and a public hearing was conducted on January 11, 2011, pursuant to Education Code Section 47605, to consider the level of public support for the Charter School by teachers employed by the District, other employees of the District, and parents; and

WHEREAS, the Board considered the level of support expressed at that public hearing for the Petition by teachers employed by the District, other employees of the District, and parents; and

WHEREAS, the Board has obtained, reviewed, and analyzed the Petition and all information received with respect to the Petition, including all exhibits and supporting documentation; and

WHEREAS, in reviewing the Petition, the Board has been guided by the intent of the California Legislature that charter schools are and should become an integral part of the California educational system and that establishment of charter schools should be encouraged.

*NOW, THEREFORE*, the Board does hereby grant the Petition, with the following revisions to the charter and conditions. Should Petitioners fail to make the required revisions and meet the following conditions; the Petition shall be deemed to be denied pursuant to this resolution. The Memoranda of Understanding, once executed, shall be affixed to the charter, shall be incorporated by reference thereto, and the terms and conditions of the Memoranda of Understanding shall be treated as having full force and effect as if contained within the charter.

Petitioners shall make the following required revisions and meet the following conditions according to the timelines set forth herein:

#### **Ongoing Concerns**

While BASE is lauded for its aim to provide a UC "a-g" curriculum for all students, it is crucial school administrators and staff continues their ongoing efforts to focus on instructional rigor in the classroom to achieve a vision of adequately preparing students for post-secondary success. The Charter Renewal Site Visit Review Report indicates there still remains considerable work with regard to BASE's Special Education students, particularly with regard to bringing BASE into legal compliance with students' IEPs and 504 Plans. That document also names a need for training and support of teachers through professional development to provide research-based curriculum and instructional strategies to support students with serious skill deficits and learning disabilities in reading, writing and/or mathematics.

While adoption of a value-added assessment system (i.e., NWEA MAP) is of potential benefit to BASE's instructional program, work is required to help school staff create formative assessments that will also regularly measure student progress in BASE classroom learning and help inform ongoing instructional improvement. Meanwhile, a Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC) Accreditation Report from March of 2010 indicated how BASE must now focus on instructional program coherence through collaborative curriculum development and continued efforts at better use of student performance data to drive instructional improvement, particularly in mathematics. Finally, it is the expectation of both WASC external and AUSD internal site visit teams that BASE must now focus on improving classroom instruction through offering increased professional development to BASE staff going forward.

#### Conclusion

The Board finds that, as set forth above, the Petition satisfies the five legally required categories set forth in Education Code Section 47605 and at least one of the four criteria for academic achievement set forth in Education Code Section 47607.

For all of the forgoing reasons, the Board hereby approves the Petition for renewal of the charter of the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE).

# **Background**

- The BASE charter renewal petition was submitted to AUSD on November 23, 2010 at a regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting.
- The Board of Education held a public hearing on January 11, 2011.
- The Board of Education is required by law to grant or deny the petition within 60 days of January 11.
- The staff report is before you tonight for your review.
- A decision to approve or deny the BASE charter renewal petition will be February 8, 2011.

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# **Criteria for Denying Charter Petition**

#### Education Code 47605

- 1. The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.
- The BASE charter renewal petition presents a <u>sound</u> educational program:
  - Meeting UC "a-g" requirements is a graduation requirement for all BASE students. To this end, college readiness has continued to be a core area of focus.
  - The BASE Theory of Action (section 3.1), the youth outcomes (Section 3.2) and the school-wide action plan (4.1) serve as the framework for curriculum coherence.

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# **Criteria for Denying Charter Petition**

- All coaches return to school a month before the school start date
  to review and customize curriculum. This time is also used to
  assess specific student needs and ensure that each student is
  making appropriate progress toward graduation goals.
- Individual students are supported to take a customized course of study to support either remediation needs, advanced work or career interests.

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# **Criteria for Denying Charter Petition**

- 2. The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
  - •The petitioners and Board members are capable individuals with experience in public education and with charter schools.
- 3. The petition does not contain the number of signatures required by subdivision (a). A petition must be signed by one of the following:
  - a. A number of parents/guardians equivalent to at least one-half of the number of students that the charter school estimates will enroll in the charter school for its next year of operation.
  - b. A number of teachers equivalent to at least one-half of the number of teachers that the charter school estimates will be employed at the school during its next year of operation.

BASE selected (b): The petition contains the required signatures.

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# **Criteria for Denying Charter Petition**

- 4. The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code 47650 (d).
  - The petition <u>does</u> contain an affirmation of each of the required conditions contained in Education Code Section 47605(d) (1).
- The petition does not contain reasonable comprehensive descriptions of the charter provisions in Ed Code 47605 (b) listed in "Components of Charter Petition" above.
  - The petition <u>does</u> contain reasonable comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

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## Additional Criteria for Denying Charter Renewal Petition

In addition to the five criteria set forth in Education Code d 47605, Education Code 47607 (b) requires of a charter renewal that the charter school meet at least on of the following criteria:

- (1) Attained its Academic Performance Index (API) growth target in the prior year or in two of the last three years, or in the aggregate for the prior three years.
- (2) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API in the prior year or in two of the last three years.
- (3) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API for a demographically comparable school in the prior year or in two of the last three years.

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# Additional Criteria for Denying Charter Renewal Petition

- (4) Academic performance of the charter school is at least equal to the academic performance of the public schools that the charter schools pupils would otherwise have been required to attend, as well as the academic performance of the schools in the school district in which the charter school is located, taking into account the composition of the pupil population that is served at the charter school.
- BASE attained its Academic Performance Index (API) growth target in the 2009-10 School year with 71 points growth.

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# **Ongoing Concerns**

- While BASE is to be lauded for its aim to provide a UC "a-g" curriculum for all students, it is crucial school administrators and staff continue the school's ongoing efforts to now focus on instructional rigor in the classroom to achieve its vision of adequately preparing students for post-secondary success.
- The Charter Renewal Site Visit Review Report indicates there still remains considerable work with regard to BASE's Special Education students, particularly with bringing BASE into legal compliance with students' IEPs and 504 Plans.
- •That document also names a need for training and support of teachers through professional development to provide research-based curriculum and instructional strategies to support students with serious skill deficits and learning disabilities in reading, writing and/or mathematics.

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# **Recommendation to Board of Education**

- Staff recommends that the AUSD Board of Education approve Resolution No. 11-0006 granting the charter renewal petition for the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE).
- The charter renewal petition satisfies the five legally required categories of Education Code 47605 as well as the additional criteria of Education Code 47607(b).
- If approved, the term of this charter renewal will be from July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2016.
- A charter may be revoked by the authority that granted the charter if the authority finds that the charter school has committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards, or procedures set forth in its charter.

**Charter Petition Request** 

#### **ACTION REQUESTED**

Staff recommends the Board of Education approve the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE) petition for charter renewal because the charter school has been deemed to have met the standards set forth in the California Charter Schools Act and Education Code Sections 47605 and 47607 which govern charter school renewals. The previously approved BASE charter is amended from the filed petition to incorporate the included revisions, conditions and deadlines now set forth in the accompanying Board Resolution 11-0006.

As required by Education Code Sections 47605 and 47607, the petition meets the following criteria: the school presents a sound educational program; the charter petitioners are likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition; the petition contains the required signatures and affirmations; and the petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of all 16 elements required by the California Charter Schools Act.

#### **SUMMARY**

Staff now recommends the Board of Education approve the petition to renew the charter of the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE) under the California Charter Schools Act.

### PROCEDURAL BACKGROUND

- 1) A Representative from BASE submitted the BASE charter renewal petition on November 23, 2010 at a regularly scheduled Board of Education meeting.
- 2) A public hearing was held on January 11, 2011. Numerous representatives from the lead petitioning group presented to the Board of Education at that time.
- 3) Pursuant to Ed Code section 47605(b), BASE and AUSD mutually agreed to February 8, 2011 for AUSD to act on the charter renewal petition.

#### **School Vision**

Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE)

We envision generations of young adults who are inspired and prepared to transform their lives and their communities.

## **Program's Distinguishing Features**

Bay Area School of Enterprise's education program includes the following features:

- Student data reflects a commitment to youth who have been unsuccessful or unchallenged in traditional schools, as well as those from underserved communities.
- BASE maintains graduation requirements equal to UC "a-g" requirements as evidence
  of its stated belief in the potential of all youth to go to college. High rates of graduation,
  college acceptance and post-secondary planning are all evidence of the strength of
  BASE's commitment to providing post-secondary options for all students.
- BASE remains a small learning community with small class sizes and high ratios of adults to youth, reinforcing its focus on fostering meaningful relationships among all community members.
- Social enterprises have remained a constant feature of the instructional program, consistent with BASE's original pedagogical philosophy.
- Youth performances continue to be required for all BASE students, both in the school's implementations of social enterprise projects and through Presentations of Learning.
- Youth-adult collaboration, distributed leadership and democratic principles are clearly demonstrated in youth projects, school management and governance.

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#### STATUTORY BACKGROUND

#### Pursuant to Education Code § 47605

Charter law outlines specific criteria governing the approval or denial of petitions for renewal of charter school petitions.

The following excerpt is taken from the Charter Schools Act, Education Code § 47605. This excerpt delineates criteria for charter approval and denial:

A school district governing board shall grant a charter for the operation of a school under this part if it is satisfied that granting the charter is consistent with sound educational practice. The governing board of the school district shall not deny a petition for the establishment of a charter school unless it makes written factual findings, specific to the particular petition, setting forth specific facts to support one or more of the following findings:

- 1) The charter school presents an unsound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.
- 2) The petitioners are demonstrably unlikely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- 3) The petition does not contain the number of signatures required.
- 4) The petition does not contain an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code § 47605(d).
- 5) The petition does not contain reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

The following excerpt is taken from the Charter Schools Act, Education Code § 47607(b). This excerpt delineates additional requirements for charter renewal:

Commencing on January 1, 2005, or after a charter school has been in operation for four years, whichever date occurs later; a charter school shall meet at least one of the following criteria prior to receiving a charter renewal pursuant to paragraph (1) of subdivision (a):

- 1) Attained its Academic Performance Index (API) growth target in the prior year or in two of the last three years, or in the aggregate for the prior three years.
- 2) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API in the prior year or in two of the last three years.
- 3) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API for a demographically comparable school in the prior year or in two of the last three years.
- 4) The entity that granted the charter determines that the academic performance of the charter school is at least equal to the academic performance of the public schools that the charter school pupils would otherwise have been required to attend, as well as the academic performance of the schools in the school district in which the charter school is located, taking into account the composition of the pupil population that is served at the charter school.

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#### DISCUSSION

Staff convened a review team comprised of leadership within the District. These individuals subsequently conducted a three day site visit and an evaluation of the petition pursuant to the Charter Schools Act and applying the Alameda Unified School District Charter School Board Policy and Administrative Regulations.

### (1) The petition presents a sound educational program.

The BASE educational program is improving and continues to be an ongoing area of focus for both the staff and their governing board.

- Academic test results confirm the BASE educational program is demonstrating growth (e.g., 71 point growth in 2010 API).
- Meeting UC "a-g" requirements is a graduation requirement for all BASE students. To this end, college readiness continues as a core area of focus.
- The charter renewal petition describes the BASE Theory of Action (Section 3.1 pg. 32), youth outcomes (Section 3.2 pg.33) and school-wide action plan (Section 4.1 pg. 43) that serve as the framework for the charter school's curriculum coherence.
- All coaches (teachers) return to school a month before the school's start date to review
  and customize curriculum. This time is also used to assess specific student needs and
  ensure that each student is making appropriate progress towards graduation goals.
- Individual students are supported to take a customized course of study to support either remediation needs, advanced work or career interests.
- Given a small student population at BASE and the fact that a majority of students enter below grade level, there is a specific focus on the use of Value Added Assessment measures as a key driver of instructional program improvement.
- BASE implemented the Northwest Evaluation Association (NWEA) Measures of Academic Progress (MAP) assessment in the 2008-2009 school year. MAP is a computer-based adaptive test that helps determine students' skill levels in Reading, Mathematics, and Language Usage. These are key skill areas also tested on the California High School Exit Exam (CAHSEE) and other state tests.
- Evaluation of assessment data allows for targeted academic intervention and identification of specific youth needs. BASE staff continues to focus resources and attention in this area. MAP assessments were conducted in fall and spring semesters for areas listed above in 2009-2010. Science was added to assessments in 2010-2011.

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## **Academic Performance Data**

Academic performance data confirms that the BASE charter school educational program is improving with the school's continuing focus on data-informed instructional improvement. Thus, changes implemented by BASE in recent years are seen to be demonstrating growth in student academic performance (evidenced by a 71 point growth in 2010 API growth reports).


BASE graduation rates and college admission rates continue to increase over time.



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## External Evaluator Feedback: Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC)

BASE received a Three-Year Term Revisit WASC Accreditation Report in March of 2010. BASE received a Certificate of Accreditation for three years. The WASC assessment of BASE is of course not binding on AUSD's Board of Education. However, preliminary conclusions of this respected external third party evaluator (WASC) provide additional evidence supporting the conclusion that BASE is on the right path to improvement of its educational program.

The WASC visiting team prepared and shared a preliminary exit report for BASE commending the following aspects of the charter school's instructional program:

- "The school has undergone an evolutionary process that has changed attitudes about learning and teaching and developed an atmosphere that cherishes individuality and community responsibility and a strong regard for continued education."
- "The team witnessed students taking pride in their accomplishments and being active participants in their educational development."
- "New assessment tools have been introduced that provide detailed information on individual needs and strengths in realistic time."
- "BASE leadership and staff developed a new Schoolwide Action Plan (SWAP) and developed "action research" to drive the implementation plan and school improvement."
- "The action plan goal creates instructional program coherence through collaborative curriculum development with an emphasis on value added data."
- "There is progress in the literacy program as students have improved academic reading ability as well as having increased their leisure reading."
- "The team witnessed coaches/teachers guiding students through educational challenges that involved a variety of differentiated instructional strategies."
- "BASE offers additional supports that include an after school learning lab with tutors for project assistance, computer use and CyberHigh to allow students to make up additional credits at an individual pace."

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# (2) The petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.

The petitioners are likely to successfully implement the program as set forth in the petition. The petitioners and Board members are very capable individuals with considerable experience. BASE's staff and Board members are committed to this unique population of students.

Successful implementation of any charter school depends on financial and budgetary stability. A review of the budget confirms that BASE's three year budget and reserves are adequate to support the program described, thus indicating that BASE is a financially sound charter school.

During the 2009-2010 school year, BASE served students eligible for Special Education Services. These students received specialized academic instruction through the school's Resource Specialist program. All annual and triennial IEPs were completed in a timely manner. BASE is using an outside consultant to help build in more academic support for students with special needs.

For purposes of Special Education, BASE is its own LEA pursuant to Education Code Section 47641 (a) and contracts with a non-profit agency, Pinnacle Education Services, to provide special education services for BASE, including a dedicated resource specialist to work with students and coordinate services (including IEP and SST meetings). BASE will be responsible for all costs, charges, claims, and demands related to their learners and programs, listing the following assurances to serve learners with disabilities. (pgs. 36-37):

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## (3) Petition signatures are evidenced.

Pursuant to CA Education Code Section 47605(a)(1)(B), the petition contains the signatures by a number of teachers representing an equivalent to at least one-half the number of teachers the charter school estimates will be employed at the school during its next year of operation.

## (4) Required affirmations are present.

Pursuant to CA Education Code 47605(b)(4), the petition contains an affirmation of each of required conditions contained in CA Education Code Section 47605(d)(1).

# (5) The petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

#### RECOMMENDATION

Staff recommends that the Alameda Unified School District's Board of Education approve the charter school renewal petition for the Bay Area School of Enterprise (BASE). The petition satisfies the five legally required categories of Education Code § 47605:

- (1) The charter school presents a sound educational program for the pupils to be enrolled in the charter school.
- (2) The petitioners are demonstrably likely to successfully implement the program set forth in the petition.
- (3) The petition contains the numbers of signatures required.
- (4) The petition contains an affirmation of each of the conditions described in Education Code § 47605(d).
- (5) The petition contains reasonably comprehensive descriptions of the 16 required charter elements.

The petition also satisfies at least one of following criteria set forth in Education Code § 47607:

- (1) Attained Academic Performance Index (API) growth target in two of the last three years.
- (2) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API in the prior year and in two of the last three years.
- (3) Ranked in deciles 4 to 10, inclusive, on the API for a demographically comparable school in the prior year and in two of the last three years.
- (4) The academic performance of the charter school is at least equal to academic performance of public schools that charter school pupils would otherwise have been required to attend, as well as the academic performance of the schools in the school district in which the charter school is located, taking into account the composition of the pupil population that is served at the charter school.

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This approval is for the charter program and operation in its entirety as proposed herein. Any subsequent material revision of the provision of this charter may be made only with approval of the District as charter authorizer (Education Code § 47607(a)(1)). Any material revision to any charter component must be proposed and considered according to the standards and criteria in Education Code § 47605 (Education Code § 47607(a)(2)) and in all other applicable AUSD Board Policy and Administrative Regulations.

The term of this charter will be from July 1, 2011 through June 30, 2016, the term required for a renewal under the California Charter Schools Act (Education Code § 47607(a)(1)). The District will not accept a charter renewal request more than one year prior to the expiration of the current charter.

A charter may be revoked by the authority that granted the charter if the authority finds that the charter school committed a material violation of any of the conditions, standards or procedures set forth in its charter (Education Code § 47607(c)(1)). The Board of Education's approval of this charter shall incorporate the text revisions, conditions on opening and associated deadlines provided as a condition of the charter.

The District retains the authority to delay renewal for a period of up to one year if any of the conditions are not satisfactorily met by the associated deadlines. Not meeting any one of the conditions and associated deadlines set forth in this approval may be grounds for revocation as set forth in the California Charter Schools Act (Education Code § 47607(c)(1)).
